QUESTION 2

Zolo, a 16 year old student, was brought to the psychiatric centre by his family who reported that the client started to have problems after starting high school. At first he seemed to make good adjustment, was popular and received good grades, but then his appearance and behaviour started to change. At first, the family thought he had become involved with the wrong group of friends, but when they checked with the school counselor, they were told that their son was a loner and that his behaviour was disruptive; Zolo laughed and talked inappropriately in class. The family was frustrated that no one, not even school authorities, was able to make Zolo "shape up". The family stated that the client has become eccentric in his dress and mannerisms and, over the last few months, had stopped going to school. When he began to neglect his personal hygiene and act more bizarre, they thought he was using drugs. However, no evidence of drug use was ever found, and the client rarely left the room. Zolo's younger siblings were ashamed to bring friends home because Zolo would act strangely, used bad language, masturbated in public, and talked about receiving messages from the television set. Neighbours called the police when they saw the client acting suspiciously and walking up and down their driveway. Zolo was found picking through the garbage, taking empty cans and storing them in this clothing. His speech has recently consisted of a string of words that were unrelated – he seemed to be speaking nonsense.

What psychiatric disorder is Zolo suffering from? Motivate your answer.

Rex was admitted 2 days ago following a road traffic accident in which he sustained a fracture of the left lower limb which has been immobilized on POP. He does not seem to have suffered any injuries. While taking his vital signs, Rex tells you that he was from party when the accident occurred. A few minutes later he starts shouting that snakes are climbing onto his bed wanting to bite him. 3 hours later he develops a grand mal fit on recovering from the fit he exhibits severe memory disturbances and becomes agitated.

- (b) Discuss the nursing management Rex will require.
