- 1. Virginia Woolf in "Shakespeare's Sister" (A Room of One's Own) proposes the figure of Shakespeare's imaginary sister, Judith to describe women writers' unhappy situation in the male-centred literary and theatrical world of Elizabethan England Do you agree? Substantiate your point of view.
- 2. Define dramatic monologue and discuss the character of the speaker in Browning's "Porphyria's Lover".
- 3. "Hopkins believed that there were two natures in all existence and it was difficult but wondrous duty to capture this truth" Discuss this statement with reference to his poems "God's Grandeur" and "Pied Beauty".
- 4. Discuss T. S. Eliot's 'The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock" as an interior Monologue.
- 5. Bring out the symbolic importance of the cemetery, the pond and clothing in D. H. Lawrence's "The Horse Dealer's Daughter".
- 6. Does Samuel Beckett's *Happy Days* justify its title judging from the theme?
- 7. How does Keats develop the relation between life and art in connection with the Grecian Urn in "Ode on a Grecian Urn"?
- 8. In the poem, "Ode to the West Wind" the west wind is depicted as the "source of life and death, preserver and destroyer" Do you agree? Corroborate your position.
