SECTION A: THEORY Answer ONE question

- Using illustrations from ONE of the novels studied in this course <u>In My Father's House</u>, <u>A Christmas Carol</u>, <u>Pains of a Maid</u> discuss everything you know about ONE of the following: plot, characterization, point of view.
- 2(a) Who is the respective villain or antagonist in <u>Julius Caesar</u> and <u>The Merchant of Venice</u>? [6]
- (b) Identify and account for any similarities and /or differences you may have observed in the portrayal of these two villains or antagonists. [24]
- 3. Read the following excerpts from some poems and answer the questions below:

Fear no more the heat o' the sun,
Nor the furious winter's rages;
Thou thy worldly task hast done,
Home art gone, and ta'en thy wages:
Golden lads and girls all must,
As chimney-sweepers, come to dust.

(ii)
See: the newspaper boy in the rain will sleep tonight in a doorway.
The woman in the busline may next month be on a train to a place not her own.
The baby in the backyard now will be sent to a tired aunt, grow chubby, then lean return a stranger.

A little freezing spider
Legs and arms gathered in her chest
Rocking with flu,
I saw old Granny
At Harare Market;
It was past nine of the night
When I saw the dusty crumpled Spider —
A torn little blanket
Was her web.

- a) What aspects do you examine when analysing a poem's form? [10]
- b) Comment on the different structures along with respective structural devices of the above excerpts. [20]

- 4. "Literature has been defined partly as helping people to 'understand themselves and the world in which they live.'" With reference to one of the novels you have done in this course In My Father's House, A Christmas Carol, Pains of a Maid respond to the above by:
 - a. Briefly (not more than a page) highlighting the situation faced by the novel's main character. [10]
 - b. Identifying, in point form, three themes the author has outlined through the experiences of the main character. [10]
 - c. Commenting how the main character's story has helped you to understand yourself and the world in which you live. [10]
- 5. How does Sembene Ousmane's short story, "Her Three Days" project the predicament of women in a polygamous society?
- 6. Read the following excerpt from <u>The Merchant of Venice</u> and answer the questions below:

So may the outward shows be least themselves. The world is still deceived with ornament. In law, what plea so tainted and corrupt But, being seasoned with a gracious voice, Obscures the show of evil? In religion, What damned error but some sober brow Will bless it and approve it with a text, Hiding the grossness with fair ornament?

How many cowards whose hearts are all as false As stairs of sand, wear yet upon their chins The beards of Hercules and frowning Mars, Who, inward searched, have livers white as milk? ... Look on beauty

And you shall see 'tis purchased by the weight, Which therein works a miracle in nature, Making them lightest that wear most of it. So are those crisped, snaky, golden locks Which make such wanton gambols with the wind Upon supposed fairness, often known To be the dowry of a second head, The skull that bred them in the sepulchre. Thus ornament is but the guiled shore To a most dangerous sea...

- (a) Basing your response on a close examination of the metaphors in the above excerpt, explain Shakespeare's standpoint on beauty or his definition of true love. [25]
- (b) To what extent do you agree with his definition? [5]

OR:

"In a comedy, the characters and their discomfitures engage our delighted attention rather than our profound concern; we also feel confident no great disaster will occur and usually the action turns out happily for the chief characters." Is this true with Shakespeare's Merchant of Venice? Discuss.

- 7. "G.W. Hegel, the German philosopher and critic, points out that a tragedy can always be seen as a 'conflict', not between right and wrong, but between appositive rights." How far is this critical view true of Shakespeare's <u>Julius Caesar</u>?
- 8. Read the following poem and answer the questions below:

"Farewell at the moment of parting" Agostinho Neto (Angola)

My mother (oh black mothers whose children have departed) you taught me to wait and to hope as you have done through the disastrous hours

But in me life has killed that mysterious hope I wait no more It is I who am waited

Hope is ourselves your children travelling towards a faith that feeds life

We the naked children of the bush sanzalas unschooled urchins who play with balls of rags on the noonday plains ourselves hired to burn out our lives in coffee fields ignorant black men who must respect the whites and fear the rich we are your children of the native quarters which the electricity never reaches men dying drunk abandoned to the rhythms of the death's tom-toms your children

who hunger who thirst who are ashamed to call you mother who are afraid to cross the streets who are afraid of men

It is ourselves the hope of life recovered.

- (a) Briefly state the sense/meaning and theme of the above poem. [10]
- (b) Comment on the poem's tone and mood: to clarify your answer, begin with a brief definition of these concepts. [10]
- (c) Comment on the main structural aspects of the poem. [10]
