### 1. John Milton: Paradise Lost Books I and IX

Discuss the character of Gulliver from his voyages to Lilliput and Brobdingnag.

#### 3. Edmund Spenser: "Epithalamion"

Consider "Epithalamion" as a wedding song.

#### 4. William Shakespeare: Hamlet

Bring out the characteristic features of a tragedy with special reference to <u>Hamlet</u>.

# 5. Geoffrey Chaucer: "General Prologue" to The Canterbury Tales
