1. T. S. Eliot: "The Love song of J. Alfred Prufrock"

"A mixture of levity and seriousness confronts the reader". How far is this statement relevant to Eliot's poem?

2. Robert Browning: "Porphyria's Lover"

Does Robert Browning's poem depict raw male domination, egocentricity and brutal exploitation of females? Sustain your answer with evidences from the poem.

3. D. H. Lawrence: "The Horse-Dealer's Daughter"

The failure of the Victorian Revolution in the English countryside and the resulting breakup of families with female siblings faring the worst. Is this applicable to Lawrence's short story? Elucidate your answers with illustrations from the story.

4. Virginia Woolf: "Shakespeare's Sister" (From A Room of one's own)

What is the central argument in Woolf's "Shakespeare's Sister"?

5. Gerard M. Hopkins: "God's Grandeur" and "Pied Beauty".

Show how Hopkins renders supreme praise to the God of creation in "God's grandeur" and "Pied Beauty".

6. Samuel Beckett: Happy Days

Define existentialism. What are the aspects in the play that link it to existentialism?

7. John Keats: "Ode on a Grecian Urn"

Describe clearly what is depicted on the urn and relate how it is relevant to the theme of the poem.
