### 1. John Keats: "Ode on a Grecian Urn"

### 2. Robert Browning: "Porphyria's Lover"

"The subject of this poem is the dead woman Porphyria, who is also the object of male desire" How does Browning's dramatic monologue deal with this subject?

## 3. Virginia Woolf: "Shakespeare's Sister" (From A Room of One's Own)

How does the hypothesis, 'Shakespeare's Sister' help in explaining women's marginalization in the Elizabethan Era?

### 4. Thomas Hardy: "Ah, Are you Diggin' on my Grave?"

A metaphor for the dramatic change from credible rural folk life style to artificial urban impersonality: Is this a correct assessment of Hardy's poem?

## 5. P. B. Shelley: "Ode to the West Wind"

Shelley's ode is a precursor of socio-political revolution in Europe. Do you agree?

## 6. William Wordsworth: "Composed upon Westminster Bridge"
