QUESTION 1

Ethnomethodologists have proposed, and rightly so, that there is order and structure even in the most mundane of interactions.

What are the main features of conversation that make the claim a valid one. Discuss with examples. Your discussion should tap into the features of conversation such as adjacency pairing, turn-taking, cooperation strategies, politeness etc. Be careful, not to describe the features but rather show how the features confirm the claim. You may find looking at these interactions (one marked another unmarked) helpful.

- T: Two minutes, I give you-- starting from now so leave my office
- S: Thank-you Sir you are kin---d.
