#### **Question One** (Compulsory)

Tess of the D'Urbervilles ((1890) Thomas Hardy

Focusing on **four** well-chosen scenes, discuss how Hardy had used **setting** to create a desired atmosphere as well as enhance the themes of <u>Tess of the D'Urbervilles</u>.

#### **Question Two**

Sir Gawain and the Green Knight

Discuss how the plot structure of Sir Gawain and the Green Knight follows the series of tests that he as a knight undergoes (No narration please).

#### **Question Three**

Moll Flanders (1722) Daniel Defoe

With the aid of three examples, discuss how the episodic structure of <u>Moll Flanders</u> has enabled Defoe to convincingly indict eighteenth century Britain.

#### **Question Four**

Pamela (1740) Samuel Richardson

Discuss, with close reference to the text, how <u>Pamela</u>'s episodic structure is enhanced by both its setting and epistolary and journalistic form.

#### **Question Five**

The prodigal Husband (1999) Lazarus Miti

Focusing on Musa's role in the novel, discuss how the **prodigal son motif** has shaped and defined the plot structure and progression of <u>The Prodigal Husband</u>.

#### **Question Six**

The Heart of Redness (2000) Zakes Mda

- a) Who are the 'believers' and the 'unbelievers' in The Heart of Redness? [6]
- b) Identify and discuss the conflict advanced by Mda through the above [14].
- c) What is your stand towards this conflict and its resolution? [10]

Nervous Conditions (1988) Tsitsi Dangarenbga
