Question One: Drama

Question Two: Prose

- a) Give a brief (not more than 15 lines) plot summary of EITHER "Her Three Days" by Sembene Ousmane OR Neighbours by Lilia Momple. [07]
- b) State the central theme of your chosen text. [03]
- c) Discuss with the aid of illustrations from your chosen text how writers project their intended meaning through the **interaction** of story and character. [20]

Read the poem and discuss its meaning under the following headings: a) sense or situation (b) language use (c) theme (d) tone and mood. [30]
