QUESTION 1

According to Jeff Guy, "the history of African women in southern Africa is a history of their oppression and ...the nature of this oppression and...the exploitation upon which it is based... have undergone qualitative changes overtime." (1990:34). Using examples from different countries in the sub-continent, critically examine how women have been oppressed in precapitalist (traditional) farming societies in southern Africa and how the nature of their exploitation has changed overtime.
