Answer three questions. Number 1 is compulsory and carries 30 marks, others 15.

- 1. The economy may be framed in a particular way to facilitate economic reporting.
 - (i) Illustrate how the economy may be conveniently framed for economic reporting. (10 marks)
 - (ii) Explain each of the components of such a framework. (10 marks)
 - (iii) "Generally, a reporter needs to *frame* his/her assignment." Expose the meaning of this assertion, with regard to the etymology of "reporting."

- 2. Besides literacy, *numeracy* is a requirement for economic reporters. Explain what numeracy consists of and why it is required of economic reporters
- 3. Write a news story based on Attachment 1.
- 4. **Discuss** the nature of economic information and the methods that may be used to gather economic information/data.
- 5. Assume you have been assigned a story on the opening of a new and mall in Matsapha in June. Identify the elements of interest, sources of information, and methods of information/fact gathering for the assignment.
- 6. "Economics is a quantitative subject, and every economy spews a great deal of numbers and statistics. However, economic news stories are not 'a flurry of figures,' but figures that are 'understandable and interesting' to readers, listeners, or viewers."

Discuss this statement, with illustrations of how figures SHOULD be handled in economic news stories.
